The Voluntary Protection Programs (VPP) was established by OSHA in 1982, to recognize and promote effective worksite-based safety and health management systems.

In VPP, management, labor and OSHA establish cooperative relationships of workplaces that are implementing or have implemented comprehensive safety and health management systems.

MCLB Albany achieved OSHA VPP's highest recognition in 2015, earning the designation of a VPP Star Worksite, and became the second Installation in the Marine Corps to achieve VPP Star Worksite Status.

MCLB Albany was recertified as a VPP Star Worksite in 2018. Next recertification is in 2023, so please do your part in sustaining a safe work culture, and continue improving the Command's Voluntary Protection Program.

- 3. VPP reminds us that safety is an ethical and moral responsibility. Everyone is responsible for safety. It is about culture, ownership, and accountability.
- 4. VPP is a collection of industry-wide best practices, which have proven to reduce injury and illness rates.
- 5. Continuous improvement is expected. It is achieved through collaboration and open lines of communication between employees, management and leadership.
